And now. Let's dive deeper into how to avoid job search scams.

DISCUSSION

Before you apply for that online job and get yourself into a sticky situation, pay attention to these four red flags.

1) There Isn't a Company Name in the Job Posting

This might not be the case with every job posting, but more often than not, the company name will be found in the description.

Though some companies use blind job postings to protect themselves, scammers will do it as part of an identity theft scheme.

Be careful not to include too much information about yourself. If the company calls you for an interview, ask for their information so you can do some further research before agreeing to anything else.

2) The Contact Person Can't Be Found in the Search Engines or on Social Media

It's pretty easy these days to type in someone's name in Google, Yahoo, or whatever search engine you prefer. Not saying that's a good thing, but it's pretty easy.

The first thing I would do is look on LinkedIn, though. If you don't find them there, try Facebook, then the search engine.

If you can't find any information somewhere, that's definitely a red flag.

3) They Offer You the Job Within 24 Hours of Applying

While this seems ideal, the reality of someone offering you a job without an interview isn't reality.

Legit employers are going to ask you for an interview. If they don't, run.

Here's the rule of thumb: if it seems to good to be true, it's probably too good to be true.

4) They Want to Send You Money Before You Start the Job

This is a very popular scam, and unfortunately, too many people have fallen prey to it. Scam artists will come up with creative ways to get into your bank account.

They'll mail you a check, often overnighted, then they'll ask you to deposit the check and send some of it back to them. The check clears, but by the time the bank finds out the check is bad, it bounces, and you're stuck with not only losing money, but bank fees.

RECAP

Looking for a job takes some time, especially the job you really want. Take your time and don't fall for the scams.

Find the company name, do the research, and definitely don't let them offer you money.
